- First responder or health care worker
- Living in groups of 10 or more
- An essential worker at high risk of exposure
- Have been exposed to somebody with COVID-19

We do not recommend to repeat a test after having been positive in the recent past.

What's Next?

- Four evening events per week
 - Church of Incarnation and Mount Zion First African Baptist Church
 - Two locations will shift to respond to hot spots and community requests
- 50-75 tests per event
- 1-2 larger Saturday events per month with capacity for 250 tests
- Hiring dedicated staff to greet, schedule, register, test, and call back results

UVA Health GERi-PaL Program



- GERi-PaL = Geriatric Engagement and Resource
 Integration for Post-Acute and Long-Term Care Facilities
- Helps long-term care facilities save lives by preventing COVID-19 and managing outbreaks

UVA Health GERi-PaL Program



- 5 regional facility outbreaks
- "SWAT" team of UVA physicians performed initial on-site for triage and COVID-19 testing support as needed
- Daily virtual rounds on COVID-19 positive residents:
 - Facilitates bi-directional transfers
 - Identify need for telemedicine consultation
- Full telemedicine consultation:
 - Virtual stethoscope
 - Pulmonary/critical care
 - Geriatrics/palliative care
 - Supports care-in-place model
 - Addresses goals of care
- Decreased hospitalization rate
- Lower mortality rate
